1819

Queen Victoria was born on 24 May 1819 in Kensington Palace, London. She was baptised Alexandrina Victoria, but her family nickname was 'Drina! Fifth in line to the throne. Victoria spoke German at home and learned many other languages including French, Italian and Latin - she didn't speak English until she was three! She had a strict, "dreary" childhood but loved painting, music and playing with her **pets**.



1837

After a string of **royal deaths**, Victoria became next in line to the throne. And in **1837**, aged just **18**, she was crowned Queen of the British **Empire**. It was the biggest empire the world had ever seen, including Australia, New Zealand, Canada, South Africa and later India.

1840

NAME?

Victoria met the love of her life in 1836, her German cousin Albert. Three years later Victoria proposed, and they married in **1840**. Victoria wore a white dress at her wedding, starting a tradition that many brides still follow today. The pair went on to have nine children - Victoria, Edward, Alice, Alfred, Helena, Louise, Arthur, Leopold and Beatrice.

1842-61

Victoria spoke to Albert in his native **German** and the pair shared a very close relationship. They spent many **happy summers** together in their seaside retreat, Osborne House on the Isle of Wight. In 1842, Victoria became the **first** monarch to travel by train (in a carriage furnished with velvet sofas, silk curtains and, later, a loo!). Sadly, when Albert died in 1861, Victoria became so depressed that she wore **black** for the **rest** of her life.

1861-1901

For years after Albert's death Victoria rarely appeared in public. But, when she eventually returned to public life, the country hosted huge parties where people celebrated her Golden and Diamond Jubilees (50 and 60 years as Queen). But she wasn't popular with everyone – there were eight attempts to assassinate her! Somehow, she survived them all!



1901

By the time she died on 22 January 1901, Victoria had become the longest ruling monarch in British history (she's since been overtaken by our current queen Elizabeth II). Many of her children and grandkids married into other famous royal families, earning her the nickname 'The Grandmother of Europe'.

Although she was just 150cm (4ft 9in) tall (the height of the average 12-year-old), Victoria's legacy casts a long shadow over history!
