
During STEM week the children will focus on answering the big question:

A number of us attended the annual Schools North East dinner last night at the Biscuit Factory. I was invited to attend by colleagues from the North East Leadership Centre at Newcastle University as part of our ongoing work as a nationally designated Teaching School focused on leadership training. The after dinner speech was given by Claire Fox from the Academy of Ideas. She spoke passionately about the value of freedom of speech and how differing ideas and values might co-exist.

I mention this, as we have some thinking and talking to do as a school community, about our ideas and values about family and relationships, as we start to consult and plan for the government's **new proposals for Relationship Education** due to come into effect in 2020 (**direct quotes are in italics**) The new legislation proposes our children will learn 'in an age appropriate way about the features of healthy friendships, family relationships and other relationships they are likely to encounter.'

The draft policy document goes on to suggest that 'teachers should talk' explicitly about the features of healthy friendships, family relationships and other relationships which young children are likely to encounter... to form a strong early understanding of the features of relationships that are likely to lead to happiness and security.'

Much of this learning is already in place within our existing curriculum, but in reviewing and revising provision it is important we 'ensure that the needs of all pupils are appropriately met, and that all pupils understand the importance of equality and respect.' This equality and respect must allow the full range of

views and beliefs that make up our school community to co-exist in a spirit of tolerance and understanding.

It is very clear that 'teaching about families requires sensitive and well-judged teaching based on knowledge of pupils and their circumstances.' After all, families of many forms provide a nurturing environment for children. (Families can include for example, single parent families, LGBT parents, families headed by grandparents, adoptive parents, foster parents/carers amongst other structures.)'

This 'sensitivity and well-judged teaching' requires us also to work closely with yourselves as families and carers to ensure you understand what will be taught and when; having chance to ask any important and pressing questions. Just to be clear Relationships Education does not include Sex Education which is taught in secondary schools. Primary aged children are only taught about the physical and emotional changes that occur as they become teenagers — this is part of the Science National Curriculum.

To begin to canvass your thoughts and ideas we would appreciate you taking the time to read some of the proposed changes and offering comment. You can read a short summary and comment here via survey monkey.
