I feel I need to make a rather impassioned start to this week's newsletter. Since I arrived at West Jesmond in 2013, issues with **parking and road safety** have unfortunately been a major feature of my working week. There does not seem to be the will at Council level to amend street layouts, parking restrictions etc.; for the moment at least we are stuck with arrangements we have and simply need to make the best of them. However, practically what we can change is ourselves and our habits.


Just so this is absolutely clear, what follows are a number of polite requests; these are obviously not legally enforceable by school but genuinely have staff, parent and most importantly children's safety in mind. If we don't change our parking and driving habits around school a child will be seriously injured or worse and we as a school community will have to bear that responsibility.

Moving forward, we intend to start regularly recording number plates of cars that consistently park either illegally or dangerously around school. These numbers will be passed on to the local police and parking enforcement at the council. At drop off times, please do not park across the staff car park. A number of staff have nearly been knocked over by cars manoeuvring or fighting over spaces.

Furthermore, please, please take note of the parking restrictions on Tankerville Terrace and don't park on double yellow or white zigzags. These restrictions are not in place to inconvenience us all; they are in place because risk assessments deem them necessary for pedestrian safety around school.

The statistics below, published by the Department of Transport, highlight how vulnerable children are:

An average of 1 death and 37 seriously injured children per week



Child pedestrians account for the majority of child KSI casualties



(KSI - killed or seriously injured)
