Recently, there has been a lot in the news about 'Black Lives Matter', which has been in response to the killing of a black man, George Floyd, in America. It has led to protests all over the world, including Newcastle. It was a terrible event, which has caused a lot of anger, but has also raised more awareness about the racial inequities there are in the world. We know that some of you have been really affected by this and have wanted to do something about it. Standing up for what you believe in is a brilliant and, at times, brave thing to do. Is there anything you feel strongly enough to actively change? It could be racial injustice; it could be another cause close to your heart. What do you think you could you do that would help to make a difference or a change?

One of the things we were going to look at this half term, which addresses racial inequality, was the anti-apartheid revolution, with a particular focus on Nelson Mandela. Our book would have been the child-friendly version of 'Long Walk to Freedom', a Nelson Mandela biography. It would be great if you could research the life of Nelson Mandela, why he is so well-known, and discuss what you have found out with your family. Discuss how you feel about what you have found out. How would you have felt if you had been Nelson Mandela? Do you think he was right to do what he did? Do you agree with the way he was treated? Have things changed? Why/why not?

There are many other key figures and events that have played their part in racial equality, who you may also want to research: Martin Luther King Jnr and Rosa Parks and the Montgomery Bus Boycott are two that are American-related, however there was the Bristol Bus Boycott in the UK too. Can you find out about any other events or people from Britain that have had an impact in this area.?
