Dear Parents and Carers,

Well, we made it to half term!

Thank you to all of our parents, staff and children for helping to keep us as safe as possible in these very difficult times.

I was very anxious about this term when we started in September, but in comparison to other schools in the area we have managed to escape a major outbreak of the virus in school.



Sadly, two classes in Year 1 have had to self-isolate this half term and we will make sure that these classes get the opportunity to catch up on anything important they may have missed (including school photographs).

Overall we have had only three members of staff and three children test positive. From a combined school community of 705 this is far less than I had feared initially, but does show us the need to continue to remain vigilant and careful next half term.

I would like everyone to have a lovely restful half term and recharge their batteries for the long run up to the Christmas holidays.

It is clear that Christmas in school this year will be **very different** to any other. As we are not allowed to sing, mix bubbles, use the Hall for different bubbles rehearsing, we will not be allowed to put on our usual range of end of term productions and performances. However, this gives us an opportunity to try different things with the children in school and class teachers have a whole range of ideas of what we can do to celebrate at the end of term.

It will be my last half term as Head teacher of this wonderful school and I fully intend to make the most of my time left with the children and staff. After 10 years at the school, this is clearly not quite what I had envisaged, but we have to make the best of this situation and show the resilience and determination that the children of West Jesmond demonstrate every day to me.

A look ahead to our Whole School Local Study Week - Shipbuilding from Miss Smith and Miss Byatt
