Dear Parents and Carers,

Very unusually, I am writing my weekly newsletter from home this morning. I was contacted on Wednesday morning to inform me that I had come into close contact with two teachers in another school who had tested positive for COVID 19, and as such had to take action immediately to protect our staff and children. Fortunately, as yet I have no symptoms and am fully able to work from home. It is very challenging for me as I want to be in school, especially to see the Year 6 theatre group perform Macbeth this evening. Though I know the risk of transmission is low, I felt it was important that the safety of our whole school community came first.

Fortunately Mr Jones and I were not in the office together at the beginning of the week and I cannot thank him and the Senior Leadership Team enough for keeping everything going. I fully understand how parents feel when they are informed that children have to isolate, but in this term and in light of rising cases in Newcastle we have to ensure we continue to adhere to all of the rules to protect each other.

I want to thank parents for adapting to our new traffic arrangements outside of school. Hopefully this will make arrival and dismissal as safe as possible for us all. We are going to have an increased police presence around school as part of a Newcastle city wide initiative at these important times of the school day. This is to keep everyone safe from traffic and viral dangers.

Listening to the news this morning, it is still unclear what national arrangements will be by December 18th when term ends. All we can do until then is to stick to our agreed plan and follow the guidance as closely as possible. The news re a COVID vaccine is sounding very encouraging and perhaps we can glimpse a return to a very different way of living and learning. I certainly hope so.

FINALLY, A FEW REMINDERS FROM YOUR FRIENDLY DEPUTY HEAD TEACHER

We know the majority of our parents are following the procedures we have put in place in line with our risk assessment. As we've said before this isn't to make life more difficult for you, it is in the interest of the safety of the children, staff and you. Please could all parents make sure:

- If anyone is awaiting a test in your household, you do not send your child into school
- Please can only one parent pick up and drop off from site

- All children wait with you and don't play on the equipment or run around the yard
