
Covid Isolation Rule Change: Like all of you at home, we are trying our hardest to keep up with any Covid rule changes and making sure we adapt our procedures to ensure we are complying and to make sure our children miss as little schooling as possible. 'From Monday 17 January, people who are self-isolating with COVID-19 will have the option to reduce their isolation period after 5 full days if they test negative with a lateral flow device (LFD) test on both day 5 and day 6 and they do not have a temperature. For example, if they test negative on the morning of day 5 and the morning of day 6, they can return to their education or childcare setting immediately on day 6. The first test must be taken no earlier than day 5 of the self-isolation period, and the second must be taken the following day. All test results should be reported to NHS Test and Trace.

If the result of either of their tests is positive, they should continue to self-isolate until they get negative results from two LFD tests on consecutive days or until they have completed 10 full days of self-isolation, whichever is earliest. Anyone who is unable to take LFD tests or anyone who continues to have a temperature will need to complete the full 10 day period of self-isolation.'

Year 1 focussed on some of the wonderful illustrations in the book to inspire their descriptive writing.







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







Year 2 looked at the passages of writing in The Dam that used repetition. They then used these to alter the nouns and verbs to create poems of their own. These were displayed on the collages they produced.







Year 3 looked at different poetic features, especially description using similes, and repetition. In art, they experimented with carbon printing.








Year 4 also focussed on collages in Art and created some representations of old and new Kielder. They then merged them together to create images based on the work of artist Njideka Akunyili Crosby. They also wrote

diary entries from the perspective of the animals who may have lived in the Kielder valley and considered their thoughts before and after the creation of the dam. To finish they performed some of these entries.









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




Year 5 wrote three verse onomatopoeic poems from the perspective of the girl in the story, Kathryn Tickell. Verse one looked at the village when it was still occupied. Verse two described the deserted village. Verse three described Kielder Water. In art, they produced block prints that recreated the deserted buildings in the village.







Year 6 wrote poetry that described 'The Dam - Before and After'. The poems focussed on the musical elements in each setting. In art, they created collages of Kielder Water.
