

West Jesmond Primary Newsletter 25th June 2021

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Dear Parents and Carers,

This has been a challenging week for our school and for many of our children and families. We have a small number of Covid positive cases amongst our children, and due to the guidance around close contacts this had an impact on a several of our classes. A large number of our children and some of our staff are forced to isolate at the moment and this can cause difficulties and upset as well as the disruption to education. We also know of a number of you who are self-isolating due to close contacts at work and in the community.

Government and Local Authority daily statistics show us that the areas of Jesmond around our school have some of the highest rates of positive cases nationally. We know that this will not necessarily, mean the people affected will come into contact with our families, but it does heighten the risk of community transmission and cases coming into school.

We have once again reviewed our school Risk Assessments and we continue to work our hardest to keep cases low in school and to ensure that the education for all of your children at school and at home is maintained. For each positive case in school we speak with local Public Health officials to gain their advice on the steps we are taking. Our first priority is to do all we can to keep all of our children and families safe.

I want again to thank all of you for your support at this time in picking up children from school, arranging for PCR tests, supporting children while they are self-isolating and informing the school when your child is unwell. Can I ask that, following government advice, all those named as close contacts consider taking up the offer of a free PCR test before children return to school?

IMPORTANT: Please keep your child of school if they are unwell and take a PCR test

The most important thing our parents can do at this time to keep us all safe, is to keep your child off school and to arrange a PCR test if they are unwell, even with very mild symptoms. We know the vast majority of children will be negative, but across schools we are seeing symptoms of the virus in children that are wide-ranging and can include sickness, diarrhoea, sore throats, tiredness, coughs, hay fever like symptoms and runny noses.

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
Children's Cancer Run At School

They have already smashed their target of £1000 and are now hoping to reach £2000! Well done, Team Rocco!

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




We're walking for Rocco!
